Delaware, February – December 2022

Delaware has seen a steady uptick in counterfeit pill activity since 2020, when fentanyl pill operations and a death as a result of them surfaced in public reports. In 2022, federal courts continued to crack down on this activity, sentencing three fentanyl pill dealers to between 10 and 15 years in prison. In October, the Delaware State Police forensic chemistry unit warned that a veterinary tranquilizer, xylazine, was appearing in pills and powders. Xylazine is a particular problem because it is a dangerously strong sedative that does not respond to naloxone.

Between 2012 and 2016, the FDA warned 11 Delaware physicians to stop doing business with black market drug distributors that had sold fake Botox and counterfeit cancer drugs. In 2019, Delaware's Attorney General dissolved four Delaware companies that allegedly laundered money for prescription drug smugglers.
